Bullying Prevention and Education Conference a Success

On Thursday, February 28th more than 350 educators, juvenile justice, and law enforcement professionals gathered for the Bullying Prevention and Education conference, organized and presented by the **B.R.A.C.E. Project**. Keynote Speaker for the conference, which was sponsored by the DCU for Kids foundation, was Massachusetts Attorney General **Martha Coakley**.

Representatives from each of the B.R.A.C.E. partner organizations facilitated panel discussions and grade-level working groups during the conference. Attendees also heard from Ryan Knowles, Community Outreach and Social Network Manager for The Bully Project, who outlined that organization's work in the bullying prevention field, and introduced clips from their newly-released documentary "Bully".

As a result of the success and impact of both the conference and the B.R.A.C.E., Project's work, Ryan recently notified Rob Pezzella, School Safety Liaison for the Worcester Public Schools, that the group has been nominated as a Bully Project "**Upstander of the Week**" Noted Ryan: "The award was created to highlight the work of parents, teachers, students, and advocates who have taken a proactive approach to preventing bullying in their schools, promote positive school climate, and have seen positive results accordingly. I have found in working with you over the past few months your dedication to this cause and ensuring your students feel safe and free of fear is undeniable, and embodies what The Bully Project works every day to promote."

- Roadmap to Building a Caring and Respectful School Community; this guide includes strategies shown to be effective in creating more positive social norms and cultures of caring.
- Not In Our School Videos & Quick Start Guide; these videos show inspiring examples of how educators and students have worked together to improve school climate, identify bullying hot-spots and raise awareness to end negative stereotyping.
- Welcoming Schools on "What to Say to That's So Gay"; resources to help schools embrace family diversity, avoid gender stereotyping and end bullying and name-calling in elementary schools
- Bullying and Special Needs; the National Center for Learning Disabilities (NCLD) has developed these tips for educators, specifically aimed at protecting kids with learning disabilities and other special needs.
