

# IN THE MID 1980S, the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) issued a sizeable Request for Proposals to provide services for homeless women and their young children. Friendly House, Lutheran Social Services, and YOU, Inc. were preparing to compete for the funding when a remarkable thing happened: rather than compete, these agencies came together and decided to partner on an application. Each agency chose to seek less money individually, so that they could serve more people collectively. Creative teamwork attracted additional dollars, which produced lasting impact for hundreds of young women and their children.

Purposeful partnerships. Creative teamwork. Lasting impact. These remain the core principles which guide YOU, Inc. as we complete our 44th year of serving young people and families throughout the region.

Whether in residential, community, outpatient, home-based or educational settings, our services are evolving. Over the last year our Community Behavioral Health Initiative (CBHI) team has grown significantly, connecting ever more families with a broad network of vital services. Our Dynamy Internship Year program is also expanding, accepting students who come to Worcester from across the country to attend this renowned Gap Year program. Our Counseling and Assessment Centers continue to enhance their expertise in treating children who have experienced trauma, and have become "Centers of Excellence" in this clinical specialty. In fact, our Quality Management and Training Department delivered just under 1,000 hours of professional development education to staff throughout the agency last year. The students in our Educational programs continue to shine, meeting and often far exceeding academic expectations against long odds, and completing hundreds of hours of community service along the way.

Across the agency, our clinical staff is working tirelessly to create positive change for court-involved youth, teen parents, and children and families struggling with complex mental health issues every day.

We want to thank our partners – the families who entrust their loved ones to us, a Board of Directors which has supported us through this transition period and kept our eyes focused firmly on the future, and the philanthropic community which has supported us so generously over many years. Most of all, we want to thank our talented and dedicated staff. They are truly the best in the business, and because of them, the phrase "YOU, Inc'er" is spoken with respect across the region.

And by the way: the three programs from the original HUD grant are all alive and well, continuing to help young women and children to lead safe and productive lives. Proof positive that purposeful partnerships and creative teamwork create lasting impact.

# COMPREHENSIVE FOSTER CARE

There can be no more profound responsibility than to provide a safe, loving, and stable home for a child who is separated from their biological family.

YOU, Inc.'s Comprehensive Foster Care Program provides specialized foster care services and placements for children from infancy to age 18, in foster homes managed by YOU, Inc. While in our care, foster children and families receive case management services, individual and family counseling if warranted, and support for all basic needs such as transportation, advocacy, and medical attention. Our philosophy emphasizes the importance of focusing on a child's strengths and interests, so our case managers make every effort to encourage and support a child's participation in activities such as youth sports, afterschool activities and the arts.

Yet despite all of the services our agency provides, the program's success rests squarely on the shoulders of those caring and dedicated people who open their homes to children in their greatest hour of need. You'll meet just a few of those amazing foster parents here, but rest assured that there are so many more men and women across the state working tirelessly to better the lives of vulnerable children through Foster Care.

# Sasheyra Foster

At just 22 years old, **Sasheyra Foster** is a bright and capable college student, working towards a degree in Urban Studies and planning for a career in social work, preferably at the Department of Children and Families. Since she's also just successfully completed her first assignment as a Foster Parent – caring for sisters aged 4 and 6 – we think she can make that happen.

Sasheyra's inspiration for becoming a foster parent is her mother, who fostered children, usually siblings, for over ten years. After graduating from Worcester Technical High School and while earning her Associate's degree, Sasheyra interned at both the YWCA's Young Parent Program and at LUK, Inc. - both experiences which cemented her desire to pursue a life helping children. Despite her busy college

course schedule, she enrolled in training to become a foster parent, with a desire to learn the system from "the inside out."

Sasheyra's apartment is in the same home as those of her large and extended family. That readily available warmth and stability, she says, was a wonderful example to the first children she fostered. The girls were able to experience first-hand, she notes, the loving "village" that it takes to raise a child facing overwhelming adversity in their young life.

Sasheyra is equally grateful for the consistent and effective support of the YOU, Inc. staff, who "uplifted me in times of difficulty. They know that if the foster parent is supported and thriving, the foster child will be also."

# Ken and Chrissy Fairbanks

Twenty years ago, Ken and Chrissy Fairbanks were the young parents of two boys and a girl under the age of six, with a bedroom to spare in their beautiful Auburn home. With a love for children and a commitment to serving others to guide them, they opened their home to the first of many foster children, one who lived with the Fairbanks family for close to ten years.

Ken is the Highway Superintendent for the town of Auburn, and Chrissy is a Supervisor of Cash Operations at the College of the Holy Cross. A fourth child of their own came along a few years after they began fostering, yet despite their busy lives and careers, Ken and Chrissy have never tired of providing a safe and structured environment for adolescents and teens who are at their most vulnerable. Both parents home is far from easy, but they are adamant that with the ready and seasoned support of YOU, Inc. caseworkers, the rewards have far outweighed the difficulties.

Ken and Chrissy maintain contact with several of the young people they've fostered, and several continue to visit and attend family events. Both of the Fairbanks' biological daughters wrote poignant college essays detailing how their own lives were shaped by the experience of growing up with foster siblings - bringing full circle this selfless couple's lasting impact on the children who were lucky enough to call their house home.




# FAMILY **PARTNERS**

More than six years ago, YOU, Inc. embarked on a new initiative to provide Wraparound services with funding from MassHealth. This venture was the result of the "Rosie D" lawsuit, filed by parents who were seeking a comprehensive range of services for their children struggling with behavioral health issues. In the Wraparound model – a nationally-recognized strategy adopted by Massachusetts – Family Partners work in conjunction with Intensive Care Coordinators (ICC) to deliver services. YOU, Inc.'s Family Partners serve in several programs as parent coaches and peer support workers, helping families to navigate the complex children's mental health system.

One of the major principles of Wraparound is Family Voice and Choice; when YOU, Inc. undertook this journey, family voice and choice were just words. But as our services unfolded and we began hiring parents with personal experience raising children with emotional difficulties, these words took on a deep and fundamental meaning.

Each of these Family Partners has a unique story, revealing the individual path their family has taken. In their coaching with other parents, the Family Partners share that story as a means to counteract the isolation that so many parents in their situation feel. Our Family Partners offer not just empathy, but the practical strategies and skills parents need to access a healing network of services for their family. For example at our Worcester Family Resource Center, our Family Partner helps to connect parents with community-based resources for childen who might otherwise be faced with a more traumatic hearing in the Juvenile Courts.

In every case, where once these families felt powerless to effect change for their child, working with a Family Partner in the wraparound model brings empowerment, and a renewed sense of hope.

YOU, Inc. Family Partner **Deb Grazulis** had already raised three children of her own by the time she adopted four children she had fostered through the Department of Children and Families. One adopted son struggled with mental health issues accompanied by aggressive behaviors, which resulted in an out-of-home placement for three years. Yet despite the significant challenges of raising all of the siblings, this remarkable woman educated herself on the breadth of Children's Behavioral Health Initiative (CBHI) services available for these children in need.

When she was assigned a Family Partner and Intensive Care Coordinator for her family, Deb quickly became a CBHI expert in her own right – marshalling resources on her own, and sharing her findings with her son's team of caregivers. YOU, Inc.'s Milford CBHI Senior Family Partner Cheryl Marino-Page suggested that Deb consider becoming a member of her team, and a new career was born.



Paula LeBlanc was likewise raising a son with mental health challenges, and receiving Wraparound CBHI services. This model of care is designed to meet the multiple needs of not just the affected youth, but his or her family as well – effectively "wrapping" the family with needed services. Parent Partners play a key role in the model, helping parents to explore and implement the right services at the right time for their child -- whether they be community-based, or in residential placements.

For Paula, the ability to choose and plan the care that her son received was critical to her success; she felt supported in her choices, and no longer questioned her ability to decide what was best for her child. And like Deb, Paula became extremely well-versed in the CBHI system and approach – making her yet another perfect candidate for the YOU, Inc. Milford CBHI team.

Both Deb and Paula believe that their own experiences in raising children with mental health challenges are the single most important factor in their success with client families. They understand first-hand the struggles these families face, and they have practical experience in navigating the sometimes complex system of care. They teach, they support, and they empower families to become their child's best advocate.

They are trusted partners, in the truest sense of the word.

# INTERNSHIP YEAR

When **Anne Womer** attended Dynamy Internship Year (a gap year for students who want to learn differently) in 2011, she liked having a full plate—literally. That fall, she took the lead on planning and motivating her class to pull off a complete Thanksgiving dinner to celebrate the genuine community they were fast becoming. She filled her plate figuratively as well: optional Dynamy/Clark University seminars, extra hours at her internships, and serving as a liaison to staff for her peers. Anne's internships were all in the service of others, including her most personally impactful one at YOU, Inc.'s Wetzel Center.

"I think the most meaningful part of my Wetzel experience was when I was hired to work as a staff member, and my first full day was Thanksgiving with the children whose families who couldn't make it. It was just so moving, being able to share that day with them and help them celebrate."

After Dynamy, Anne chose to stay in Worcester for college, attending Clark University full time while also working at the Wetzel Center. Eventually, she also worked as an ABA therapist while an undergraduate. This past spring, she graduated magna cum laude with her Bachelor's degree in Psychology and Studio Art (dual majors).

She is currently pursuing her Master's in Public Administration at Clark as well. When asked what her professional goals are she answers, steady-eyed: "CEO of my own nonprofit."

With her clear vision, intelligence, work ethic, and ability to effectively manage her full plate, Anne is well on her way. Today, while on track to earn her MPA next year, she also works full time at LUK's Crisis Center as the SAVE Victim Services Coordinator. SAVE provides services to victims and loved ones of impaired driving accidents, providing case management, crisis intervention, counseling, and legal, medical, educational and occupational advocacy. This fall she will give back to current Dynamy students by delivering workshops on impaired driving to both the Internship Year and Youth Academy programs.

Like most meaningful life experiences, the impact of a well-timed, mentored gap year extends well after a student completes the program, and often positively affects others as well. As Anne shows, once you know how to keep your plate full, you can share it with others.

"After Dynamy I decided to stay in Worcester and continue working in the human services field. I felt like I entered college with more of an understanding of what I wanted for myself, my career, and education."

In FY15, YOU, Inc. provided individual services to more than 11,400 children, adolescents and family members from across Central, North Central, and South Central Massachusetts.

Our **Community-Based Services** include a diverse continuum of therapeutic programs, from adolescent substance abuse services, to in-home therapy and family stabilization, positive parent coaching, pregnant and parenting teen support, therapeutic mentoring, and adventure-based experiential education.

- Our Family Stabilization Services (FSS) team served
   233 families, conducted Occupational Therapy assessments and plans, and held bi-weekly Family Days over the summer and during school vacation, including Yoga and Art in the Park, and Sibling Days.
- In conjunction with the MassGrad Coalition, our Day
   Treatment program conducted a 6-month series of
   group workshops for high-risk youth, aimed at bolstering
   the students' support system and increasing
   attendance and academic performance.
- CBS clinicians and other YOU, Inc. staff collaborated on a unique pilot Peer Leadership and Transition program at North High and Worcester East Middle School, to reinforce the schools' values of perseverance and leadership. Students and faculty participated in the experiential and recreation-based training.
- As of September of 2015, the Centralized Referral Department had entered over 20,000 referrals!

Our **Out-of-Home Care** programs provide short and long term care, as well as hospital diversion placements for children, adolescents and young adults from birth to age 22. These programs include specialized placements for male adolescents, community-based acute care, supervised and community-immersed living for young women and teen parents, comprehensive foster care, and stabilization for very young children and pre-teens.

- Our Foster Care program was awarded a new 8 year contract, and the team provided monthly enrichment activities for all youth in care including a Sweet 16 celebration which was the first-ever birthday party this young woman had experienced. Two sets of siblings were able to stay together while in the program, and two children are in the process of being adopted by their YOU, Inc. Foster Parents.
- Our Teen Parenting programs assisted young mothers and their children to achieve significant milestones and successes this year. Three graduated from College in May, and one is already working in health care; four students completed their high school education this year, including one who graduated with High Honors.
- Our Adolescent and Latency STARR programs offered out-of-home care, therapeutic services and academic support to 89 youth this year. A full 100% were able to attend their home district school – a difficult feat, but such an important factor in their successful reunification with family or a permanent living situation.
- The Cottage Hill Academy Staff was recognized in a state-level review for their outstanding clinical documentation – a reflection of the exceptional quality of care delivered to CHA clients.
- Thanks to their tireless fundraising and generous assistance from colleagues, the Cottage Hill Academy staff crossed the finish line in their drive to raise \$20,000 for a new therapeutic playground.

Our dynamic **Family Support Networks** include partnerships with the Massachusetts Department of Children and Families (Worcester West), the Mass Health Children's Behavioral Health Initiative (CBHI), the Massachusetts Department of Youth Services, and Worcester Community Connections Coalition.

- The DYS Community Services program provided 41
  activities and **community service projects**for DYS committed youth, including an annual DYS
  Basketball Tournament, Positive Youth Development
  Field Day, Drug and Alcohol Safety programs, indoor
  skydiving, and hiking excursions.
- In fiscal year 2015, our Community Service Agency team served 278 at-risk families in South Central MA, providing Parent Partners to assist families in successfully completing the wraparound care planning process.
- In April of 2015, YOU, Inc. in partnership with the
  Worcester Community Connections Coalition initiated
  and opened the Worcester Family Resource
  Center, after a successful bid to operate this statewide
  model in the Central MA region.

Our **Counseling and Assessment** services address a broad range of behavioral health needs, including substance abuse, early childhood mental health, psychiatric services, individual and group therapy, and an array of specialized assessments.

- The Gardner Counseling and Assessment Center served
   155 school-based clients at 20 different schools in North Central MA last year.
- Ann Berube, our Gardner Family Resource Specialist, received the Excellence in Family Leadership Award at the Parent/Professional Advisory League conference in May.
- The Worcester Counseling and Assessment Center worked directly with over 1,000 children and adolescents this year, as well as multiple members of their families. The team offered 24 different therapy groups during the year.
- The Southbridge Counseling and Assessment Center graduated 9 women from its first Women's Trauma Group, and initiated a new collaboration with the Grow School to reduce aggressive behaviors and absenteeism.

Our **Education and Employment** services include seven comprehensive educational programs: two specialized therapeutic day schools; two college access programs; education for employment (HiSet/GED) programs; an experiential Gap Year program; and a 45-day Assessment Program providing comprehensive special education, behavioral and clinical evaluations for middle and high school students.

- Our Education for Employment (EFE) program achieved tremendous results, with 93% of participating students receiving their High School Equivalency (HiSET) degree. EFE students completed more than 300 hours of community service, and a full 85% of participants exiting the program went on to either a job or post-secondary education.
- Dynamy's Internship Year participants completed
   26,000 Internship and Community Service hours throughout Worcester County; a full 100% of Dynamy Youth Academy's 2015 graduates will attend
   college this fall, and those students completed
   2,000 community and internship hours.
- The Upward Bound program also saw 100% of its graduating seniors – the largest group ever – successfully enrolled in college this fall.
- YOU, Inc. Educational Day Academy's Peter
  Germano was selected as Teacher of the Year
  by the Massachusetts Association of 766 Approved
  Private Schools (MAAPS). YEDA seniors successfully met
  all requirements for high school diplomas, and logged
  720 Internship hours.




